Shelley is a Registered Nurse working in obstetrics at Eastern Maine Medical Center and as the Veazie School Nurse.

As we 'take stock' of the beauty and abundance that surrounds each of us, this is the month we also 'take stock' of how much we will gratefully share with others in 2015 through our beloved Church of Universal Fellowship. Your monetary commitment to your faith community is of vital and Biblical importance to being a Christian.

Consecration Sunday Is Coming!

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their churches merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as the way givers grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their income. Therefore, the Trustees have again chosen the Consecration Sunday Program as the best way to present the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving. Our emphasis this year will be *Blessed to be a blessing!* We are again delighted that our guest speakers will be members of our own church family: Johanna Szillery, Brian McGill and Shelley Gilman!

Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of an organization who should pay dues, *our church treats people like followers of God who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship.* Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?" During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we will ask our attendees and members to make their annual financial commitments for the year 2015 for our church's worship, education and mission ministries carried out through its presence here in the Greater Bangor area. Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving/Pledge Card does so voluntarily while attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We also urge people who feel strongly opposed to completing a card to attend the Consecration Sunday worship service and luncheon. The commitments are made in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a Pledge Card. We will do no home solicitation to ask people to fill out a Pledge Card. During morning worship, our guest leaders, Johanna, Brian and Shelley, will conduct a period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship. We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Trustees and others who fill leadership positions in our church. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship. Consecration Sunday is November 16th! Please mark your calendars now and plan to be with us for worship and for our Celebration Luncheon! Thank you in advance for your enthusiastic participation in these events!

Our Ministry Plan for 2014 Supported by Our Financial Gifts

January – December 2014 Operating Budget \$242,726

Pledged income for this period totals \$191,922. In order to complete the work we planned to do this year, we expect to receive \$18,352 from sources other than pledges such as special gifts, donations for use of the building, and \$32,452 taken from investment accounts.

Outreach to Local Community \$28,027

Through providing meeting space, your gifts support the work of organizations such as Children's International Summer Village, Orono Health Association, the American Red Cross, Orono Public Schools, Operation Breaking Stereotypes, Stillwater Community Arts, Women of the World, and many other local, community-building organizations. Our minister, staff and singers visit community residents, retirement villages, nursing homes, hospitals, and participate in community programs.

Spiritual Formation: Children, Youth, Adults \$46,287

Under the leadership of our Minister, our Religious Education, Sunday School and Youth Group leaders, and the Spiritual Growth and Adult Education Teams of the Board of Deacons, CUF has developed an excellent education program for all ages. Your gifts support staffing, curriculum materials and supplies, Bible study classes, spiritual enrichment classes, and forums on current issues.

Ministry of Worship \$86,979

Worship is central to our congregation's life. Planning for Sunday services, preparing sermons, conducting weddings, funerals, and special services requires much of our minister's time. Our Directors of Choirs and our Organist consult with the Minister, select music, plan and conduct rehearsals of choirs, and inspire us week after week with their praise of God. Our Office Administrator prepares bulletins and notice sheets for services.

Care of Our Church Family \$40,943

Ministerial care is a vital part of our work, especially for persons who are ill, hospitalized, bereaved, preparing for marriage, going through divorce, or facing a crisis. Our Office Administrator provides information, scheduling, and financial accounting services, prepares reports for the annual meeting, produces our monthly newsletter, our annual directory, and coordinates the calendar of our very busy church family.

Care of God's House of Worship \$40,491

Our gifts pay the cost of custodial care for our extensive facility as well as the cost of its operation and maintenance, including utilities, insurance, and upkeep. Our spending plan includes money to help us better care for our building, which continues to be a beacon of cooperation, learning and understanding in our community.

..A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER:

Our budgeted pledges for the year were \$191,922 and through the 15th of October, we have received \$153,852, which is 80 % of the budgeted amount. I would like to remind everyone to keep their pledges coming in. Operating expenses are right on track – so we're doing very well so far this year!

Report from Director of Children and Youth Ministries

We have been having a great year so far in our Children and Youth programs! Our nursery children have been learning to explore and appreciate God's world through their five senses, our Elementary Children have been learning about Judaism, Jesus of Nazareth and life in 1st century Palestine and our YAWPers have been educating us all about various ways in which we can go Green and decrease our carbon footprint on the Earth.

Our teacher training on Sept 28th was a big success with 14 people in attendance. Thanks to all who attended and to Barbara Turner for organizing the food and Anna Ellis for providing the babysitting.

One important point which came out of the safety part of that training was the need to educate the adults in the congregation about the fire evacuation plan for our K-12 programs.

In the event of a fire alarm, the children will exit the Religious Education rooms along with their teachers. Parents should not come to the RE rooms in search of their children. The nursery and elementary classrooms will exit together through the nursery fire door so that there will be plenty of adults available to help with small children. The children and their teachers will walk across Juniper St. and up Main St. to the parking lot of Alpenglow Sports (the building is green with a sign out front, at 92 Main St.). Parents and caregivers can reunite with their children at Alpenglow.

Please be sure your children have shoes or slippers on at all times at church since we will not be able to go upstairs in search of shoes in the case of a fire drill.

We thank you for your cooperation in this important safety matter.

ORONO TO AFRICA:

The proceeds from **CUF's Church Picnic** last June made a big difference for children in Malawi! See the thank you letter below from Marquita Hill. Thank you again to Moe's BBQ for donating the food and to Alida and Don Coates for the fabulous Anniversary Cake!

Dear Friends,

On behalf of the people in Othakarhaka (OK) in Malawi, I want to express my gratitude for the gift of \$1200 from the Church of Universal Fellowship.

It comes at a particularly opportune time. I had accumulated the funds from friends and from myself for 500(!) new recipient farmers starting in the rainy season in November. Just imagine that about \$35 is all it takes to boost a small farmer into food self sufficiency. And their harvests are big enough not just to feed the family but to sell part and use the money to buy the agricultural inputs for the following season (plus pay for other needs). Being able to do 500 farmers made me happy, but meanwhile something else happened as described below.

Last year OK started school scholarships for orphans who passed the exams qualifying them to attend. Secondary school costs about \$90 a year per student. Last year, Betty Ingraham decided that (with her family) she would fund the four-year education of all **nine** of the orphans eligible last year for secondary school. I met with those young people when I was in Malawi this August, and was so impressed with and happy about them and so glad they could have those critical four more years of education.

THEN, just a couple of weeks ago I found out that **sixteen** orphans within the OK's ten villages had passed the qualifying exams this year. Betty and her family had already paid the fees for the second year of last year's nine students, plus two more this year. I decided to pay for at least two more. I started worrying about the other twelve students, because it felt so important to include them all. Just then – *literally, just then* – I received your letter with the \$1,200. It became possible to fund all sixteen students for this academic year.

So I am very happy. So are the 16 new students and their guardians (who could not themselves pay for the education). And Ida, who is OK's founder, is also happy as are OK's Board of Directors. So with so much happiness, perhaps you felt it even from afar.

To ice the cake, a friend decided to provide money to give each of the (now 25) students something to eat each school day. That truly is a big deal for these youngsters.

Also, I believe I already mentioned to you that we started a tailoring program this year. That is another story.

ALL the work in Malawi is being done by OK's volunteers. What's more they are happy to do it. And I am happy to do my part.

I plan to visit Maine the last week of October and would be glad to speak at any time that I am here. I'll let you know my schedule as soon as I have it.
